defiance in this particular, the American shipowner and merchant must be contented with a very insignificant position. While I am perfectly sure that any impartial coroner's jury, sitting upon the remains of our foreign shipping interests, would today bring in the verdict of 'protected to death,' I am a firm believer in resurrection; and when the financial quacks and political machinists have tried their hand in applying the stimulus of jobs, bounties and subsidies, and have given up the hopeless task, I am sure that competition and free trade in ships, and the materials and supplies for their use, will in due time restore not only our flag to the seas, and the foreign trade which naturally follows it to our citizens, but also the activity to our shipyards which is now a matter of tradition to the young and of memory among the old men!"

It is not proba-NOT PROBABLE. ble that any great number of republicans have proposed to affiliate with gold democrats and make mixed tickets a la populist, silver republican and 16 to-1 democrats. In Nebraska there has been no attempt to fuse gold democrats with gold republicans. Whether they can ever be welded is a question of great dubiety in each and every county of the state.
