its principles and nominated its candidates. For president it has chosen William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska, who, by becoming its standard bearer, thereby indorses its platform and pledges himself to uphold its principles. For vice president it has nominated Charles A. Towne, of Minnesota, a 16 to 1 republi-

There is now left but one alternative for the democratic party-either to indorse the nominees of the populist party and adopt its platform or to formulate its own declaration of principles and select democrats as its nominees. To adopt the former course will be to surrender its name, sacrifice its principles, and destroy its future opportunities.

To do the latter will be to maintain its integrity, perpetuate its principles, and ultimately rejoice in its triumphs.

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
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
