Whether the action of the debating association excluding women students from its membership roll was wise or not it ought to put an end to the fight that has been going on in the association for the last few weeks. It is time that some definite policy be formulated for the debates. A number of the faculty have given much valuable time to the new scheme and it is only justice to them that their work be given a chance to operate. As far as practical results are concerned it makes little difference whether or not women are admitted to the debates. At most only one or two women would take advantage of the privilege of entering the debates in anyone year, so the effects of exclusion will probably not be felt. There is a principle involved which many deem unjust, but under present circumstances it would seem the part of wisdom to sacrifice principle for the welfare of the association, for a time at least. After the new constitution has been put into force and the new scheme of choosing debaters has been rendered operative there may be time to wrangle over minor details.

Every student ought to do something toward the progress of the University more than is involved in his class duties. It would be comparatively easy for each one to write a letter to his home paper in the interests of the University. Such a letter might treat briefly of the different departments, calling special attention to manual training and the agricultural courses. Thus through their local papers people would learn of the University who never see a University calendar or a University paper. It may seem incredible, but it is a fact, nevertheless, that there are persons who know absolutely nothing about the University, more than that it exists.
