 The Department of Geology has received a new book dealing with the geological resources of the Black Hills. The author of the work is Nelson H. Dartau. _____

It would be a surprise to students and professors to look into the bacteriology laboratory these days and see the number of curious organisms that are being developed there by the advanced students of the department.

Mr. Wilson met the students desiring to join the violin section of the University orchestra Monday and yesterday afternoon. The regular meeting of the orchestra will take place this evening in the old chapel.

Professor Bessey has just received a second copy of Captain Ahern's very important work on the woods of the Philippines. The work is finely illustrated and will be especially useful to students fitting themselves for forestry work in that country.

The department of botany as received an annotated list, in manuscript, of the lichens of Alaska. It is the work of the late Professor T. A. Williams, '89, who died in Washington, D. C., about a year ago. Professor Williams was the greatest authority on lichens in the country.

The Nebraska farm is coming more and more to the front. The November number of the World's Work contains an article called the Pivotal Farm of the Union, which describes the ranch of H. D. Watson, near Kearney. Mr. Watson has successfully solved the problem of farming in a region that is subject to excessive drought. His fields attest the fact that he believes alfalfa to be the salvation of the western Nebraska farmer. The ranch embraces 8,000 acres and is divided into farms with a foreman in charge of each. The owner expects sometime to make it the seat of an agricultural training school. For foremen he wants ambitious young men with college training.

Stockmen in Nebraska are beginning to know how important it is to have an acquaintance with the best methods of rendering stock immune against diseases to which cattle and swine in our state are peculiarly liable. The importance of a knowledge of the anatomy and physiology of farm animals is also making itself felt. Losses amounting to thousands of dollars are frequently met with because of not having such knowledge as is mentioned above. The cost of attending the School of Agriculture, which began last Monday, is less than one hundred dollars per year. The subjects named above are thoroughly taught. Stockmen would do well to have their sons attend. Students will be admitted for two weeks after the opening day.

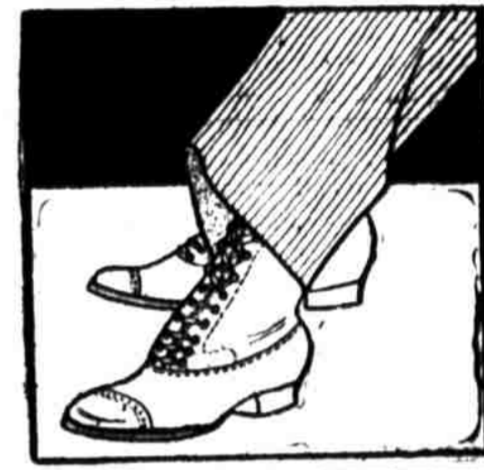
