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AS TO LIBRARY LOCKERS.

The large number of student note-books, hidden about the library, behind book-racks and shelves, indicates a need of lockers in which the student can put his books without fear of loss. The student secretes his book in this manner, because of the lack of better accommodations. The open shelves on the ground floor are inefficient and unused. So many books have been lost or stolen from these that the students are afraid to use them.

There should be a system of individual lockers in the library. The students of history, law, economics and literature would then be able to leave their note books in the library, their laboratory, just as the scientific students lock up their note books and apparatus in their private lockers in Nebraska Hall. The burdensome task of carrying their books back and forth to their homes is unnecessary and could be avoided.

The University authorities might either install a system of lockers in the library where the open alphabetical boxes are situated, or give some organization this privilege. The Y. M. C. A. might be able to undertake this work and by a nominal charge maintain the lockers with profit. These boxes can be reached at any time the outside library door is open. The number of students who would aid in such a venture could be easily ascertained by circulating a petition asking how many at a certain charge per semester would rent a box. The merit of such a convenience should cause it to receive a liberal patronage.

The electrical engineering students are greatly delighted with "Foster's Electrical Engineer's Book." The copy received yesterday at the Mechanic Arts Library was in the hands of some engineer all day long. Professor Morse recommends that all his students provide themselves with these books as the tables and a great deal of information about electrical machinery, for which a whole library must generally be consulted is condensed within this single volume.

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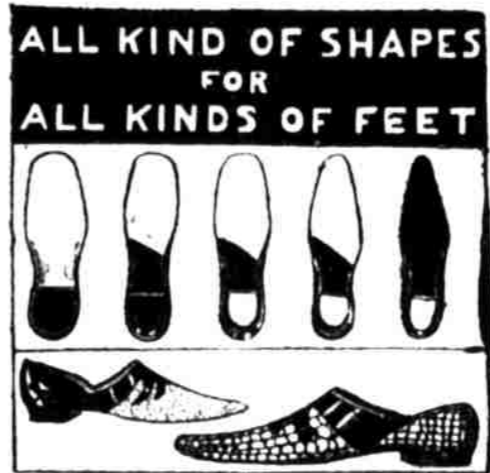
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
