endorsements of prominent men in prominent colleges and universities before they will be accepted. The limit for sending contesting productions is not later than February, and they must, in addition be printed. The committee to award the prizes is now in session at Stockholm and it is thought that an announcement of the awards will be made within a few days.

Minnesota University has a kicking contest for her football players. Each man who enters the contest has three kicks at the ball, one drop kick, one punt and one place kick. The average distance of the three kicks is then taken and the man receiving the highest average is awarded a \$25 gold medal.

A number of "University" graduates will take part in the meeting of the State Teacher's association in December.

The members of the class in Systematic Botany are struggling with the Compositae, probably the most difficult of the families of flowering plants. In order to aid them in their work Professor Bessey is giving them illustrated lectures on this family on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Mr. Keysor one of the advanced students in Botany brought to Professor Bessey a few days ago a copy of a rare old book, namely: Professor Amos Eaton's "Manual of Botany" published in 1822. It follows the old system of Linnaeus, and includes the plants in all the divisions of the vegetable kingdom, from the fungi and algae to the ferns and flowering plants.
