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PROFESSOR BARBER TO READ A PAPER

Professor G. E. Barber has received an invitation to present a paper at the annual meeting of the Archaeological Institute of America, of which he is a member, to be held at Columbia University on December 26, 27 and 28. These meetings are usually held in some eastern city and are for the purpose of discussing recent discoveries in the Archaeological field. He is also in receipt of an invitation to attend the meeting of the Chicago branch of the Institute to be held at Chicago University this month.

ADDITIONS TO THE MUSEUM.

The Morrill Geological Collections have been enriched by a set of "Tevin-Cleavage" calcites. The set consists of ten beautiful calcite crystals, showing a perfect twin cleavage. There is also added 10 specimens of a remarkable black and white flint breccia. This set of breccia surpassed anything of the kind in the museum. The broken, unworn pieces of white flint are cemented in a body of muddy colored flint. The pieces are large and showy and will soon be mounted and placed in the museum.

The later collection was found in Missouri. Dr. Barbour heard of the find and secured the collection by correspondence with local parties. These two sets are a valuable addition to collections in phenomenal geology.

Tuesday afternoon the class in Philosophy 7, under the able leadership of Dr. T.L. Bolton, visited the local hospital for the insane. They were entertained very pleasantly for three hours by Dr. Greene of the asylum who led the class through the various wards and assisted by Dr. Bolton, explained the various forms of the diseases. Much interest has been demonstrated by the class in this subject and many very interesting cases were examined. Particular study has been given to mania in its various forms, melancholia and parysis and as these patients are predominant in the institution, many different forms of these diseases were amusing as well as instructive.
