STATE Y. M. C. A. CONVENTION.

The state convention of the Nebraska Young Men's Christian Associations will be held at York, February 20 to 23 inclusive.

This promises to be the most successful convention in the history of the state. It will be easily accessible from all points in the state where associations are formed. Announcements have already been received and the programs will be out soon. All accredited delegates will receive entertainment at York and the railroads will give the uniform rate of one and one-third fare. Among the speakers and leaders of the convention will be: C. K. Ober, Chicago, representing the international committee; G. S. Phelps of Milwaukee, who will have charge of the student work; W. M. Parsons of Minneapolis, Geo. F. Bidwell, general manager; E. & M. V. R. R., Hon. S. H. Sedgwick of the Nebraska supreme court, B. B. Tyler, D. D. of Denver; Chancellor E. Benjamin Andrews; State Secretary, J. P. Bailey; Fred L. Willis, general secretary of the Omaha association, and several others. It is hoped there will be a large delegation from the University of Nebraska. Any young man who can should make arrangements to attend. A profitable time is assured.

DOANE CONFIDENT.

Doane college won the cup at the state field meet last year and she intends to keep it. The following is from the Owl: "Many of the boys are now taking regular work in the gymnasium. They have a very hard task before them in retaining the cup which was won last by year's track team at the state meet, but we feel safe in saying in view of the present favorable prospects, that the University will be obliged to work if she wins the state meet this year."

The junior class will hold its semi-annual election of officers on Tuesday February 11. The contest for the presidency of this class is usually a very spirited one inasmuch as some very important work falls to that office. As yet very few candidates are in the field and it is very probable that the election will pass off without any serious disturbance in the university atmosphere.

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
