Already the beautiful weather has tended to relieve the congested condition of the library. The juniors held a meeting yesterday morning electing Miss Edith Hess class representative to the university senate. The matter of the class party was taken up and some plans suggested for the proposed reception to the seniors. Nothing definite however will be done in regard to this until after the class party.

It is expected that before long a number of the students, who resigned or withdrew from the military department on account of dissatisfaction with the appointments, will return and take part in the military work at the request of Captain Smoke.

The recent action of the board of regents in accepting what they interpreted as the implied resignation of Miss Smith, as registrar, has caused some discussion among the students. Some think that undue advantage was taken of Miss Smith's characteristic way of making requests. Much sympathy is expressed for her because of the fact that she has just recovered from a severe illness only to find herself without a position.

Sigma Nu fraternity of Iowa state university suffered a very heavy loss Friday night of last week in the destruction by fire of their fraternity house. The loss of the house will amount to about \$4,000, which belongs to other parties. The house was valued at \$10,000, insured for \$6,000. The loss to the fraternity as a whole, in the nature of house furnishings and chapter equipments, amounts to about \$1,000. Of the fourteen men in the house each lost between \$200 and \$300 worth of individual property.

The fire was due to the explosion of a lamp in a room, which the occupants had left for a few moments. As the members of the fraternity had almost all retired for the night, they had a rather cold experience. While the building was burning the men succeeded in removing the fraternity piano. Chancellor McLean has extended the sympathy of the university of Iowa.

During the year 1901 Andrew Carnegie gave away \$40,000,000. These gifts include \$10,000,000 to the Scottish universities, \$10,000,000 to the United States for a national university, and \$7,000,000 for a technical institute in Pittsburg.—Ex.
