Manager Morrell was therefore notified the other day that Kansas would be able to play the game which had been declared off. Since then negotiations have been going on between the two institutions but all along it seemed that no satisfactory inducements would be given our team to make the trip.

The spirit of the Kansas athletic board was in the proper place, nevertheless, and the members resolved to have the team come down even if a part of the expenses had to be borne by themselves personally. Manager Mor-
