NEW WORK BY PROFESSOR CALDWELL.

An interesting pamphlet by Professor Caldwell is being sent out to teachers of the state by the department of public instruction. It consists of a concise and able discussion of the history of the United States during the two years ending December 31, 1901. In thirty pages Professor Caldwell has reviewed all the leading questions that have come prominently before the American people during the period covered.

The work is intended primarily for the use of teachers in the public schools but it is of such a nature that it might be perused with profit by every one who desires to keep in touch with public questions. In the preface Professor Caldwell gives as the purpose of the work: "To give to Nebraska boys and girls a better opportunity to know the life of their beloved country."

The first part of the pamphlet is devoted to an outline which is closely followed in the treatment of events in the narrative. A chronological table for reference is one of the features. Full page half tones of Presidents McKinley and Roosevelt add to the value and beauty of the work.

In the body of the book the different questions of importance are discussed in an under appropriate heads. The main divisions of the work are, domestic affairs, under which head political, industrial, religious, moral, scientific, educational, reform and military questions are considered; colonies and dependencies and foreign affairs.

The pamphlet will undoubtedly prove valuable for those teachers who desire a short, rational history of the last two years.
