**Novel Method of Cleaning Skeletons.**

An interesting experiment in cleaning skeletons adopted at the Wistar Institute of Anatomy has proven itself most successful and satisfactory, insects doing the work in a more satisfactory and less expensive manner than was accomplished by any of the former methods employed. Some time ago more than five hundred roughly cleaned and dried carcasses of animals of description, varying size from a bear to a mouse, were spread out on long tables in the basement rooms of the building used by the institute. In a few months almost the entire collection had been thoroughly cleaned by the larva of several species of beetles.

The musical programs which have been given from time to time at the students convocations have been highly appreciated by all. Since however so much interest has been manifested by the students in recitals would it not be well to devote some morning to a "request" program? While it is impossible that the requests of all could be granted, a program could nevertheless be given which would be the students' choice.

He has established at Chicago a branch of the Alliance Francais, and at Paris a branch school of the University of Chicago.—Ex.
