CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION.

Notices have been received from the civil service department stating that examinations for the position of aide on the coast and geodetic survey will be held April 22. For those who are successful in these examinations there is ample opportunity to rise to positions of considerable responsibility. The rank of aide is the lowest leading to the position of assistant to the superintendent and carries with it a good salary, together with various allowances for expenses. Those desiring information on the subject should write to the civil service commission, Washington, D. C., for the latest manual of examination for the classified civil service.

Examination will be given in the following subjects: Mathematics, astronomy, physics, surveying, geography and modern languages.
