The track meet Saturday brought out the fact that the university has plenty of good material for track athletics. The only drawback to a good track team is the lack of interest manifested during the winter. With the impetus given by the meet Saturday Nebraska ought to have a team that will sweep everything before it this spring.

The two victories in debate which Nebraska has won this spring are high tributes to the work which is being done by the debating department in the university. It seems that this is an opportune time to call to the attention of the students the fact that we, in our position as students, should set an example of conduct which will be worthy to be copied by all those who are willing to recognize the university as a leader of men.

As long as the celebrations of the students are conducted in a strictly gentlemanly way there will never be any occasion for the unfavorable comment which has been passed on the celebration of Saturday night. As long as the students keep within their own territory there would be no reason for "roasting" by those not connected with

the university and not familiar with the college ways of doing. In the matter of the entrance of the boys in the hall down town while there was an entertainment in progress the Daily lends its discouragement to these ways of showing enthusiasm. As long as we do not trespass on the rights of others there will be no occasion for any unfavorable comment.

In the matter of celebrations of any kind then, affecting only the university, would it not be the proper thing for the students to confine their operations to the campus where it could be kept more exclusive, and which would allow of no objections on the part of the citizens of Lincoln?
