Greek Art.

The course in Greek art given by Assistant Professor Dann is increased this semester to three hours credit. It is offered as an introduction to the stury of the life and thought of the ancient Greeks as reflected in their art and religion. The course will begin with a brief survey of the art of Egypt and Assyria, and the characteristics of Greek art are contrasted with those of oriental art on the one hand and of early Christion art on the other. The study of Greek myths is also taken up, at least so far as they can form an essential factor in the development of the art of Greece.

The course is designed to make clear the fundamental and lasting principles of aesthetic form so marvelously wrought out and refined by the Greeks. It is hoped that the course may serve to promote a just appreciation of the great works of the past, and contribute to the formation of a sound and intelligent taste in art in general.
