Oct. 4.-Boulder College vs Nebraska, at Boulder, Colo.

Attention is again called. for the beneft of all those who are interested. to the new appointments which will be made as soon as practicable on the editorlal board. Everyone interested In newspaper work and desiring to get some experience, both those outside. and within the class of fournalism, would do well to call at the office in the afternoons froin 3 to 5 o'clock, and get information they should desire. It was not intended in an cditorial of yesterday to give the impression that the work of young ladies was not solifited by the "Daily." The young ladies in the fournalism class will have their work put to use as well as that of anyone else. As a matter of fact women are coming to the front as journalbets and the field is broadening for them. Any "co-ed" then, who has Journalistie aspirations, will be given consideration on the paper.

Class politics have become a very absorbing tople to some people in the last few days. There have been called meetings, caucuses, whispered confldences and pledges of support. This all means something. The college political fierd often paver the way to greater ones, and many receive their training for public life this way. The interests concerned with these politics are not without some attractions to the average student, and present an absorbing fleld of interest beyond ac tual book study.

The following interesting figures re garding the average age of graduation at Yale has been complled by a dean of that college.
For the first decade, the average was 22 years, 6 months and 1 day: for the second, 22 years, 5 months and 13 days; for the third, 22 years, 7 months and 7 days; and for the last, 23 years 9 months and 27 days The youngest class was the second on the list, the class of 1864, with an average of 22 years and 7 days. The oldest was the class of 1899, which averaged 23 years 5 months and 11 days, the only class in the history of the college whose age has been above 23 years.
