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## GETTING INTO SHAPE

**Varsity and Scrubs Practice Hard  
—Will Be Ready for Grinnell—Put Up good Showing.**

The college team under Coach Drain is putting up the kind of football that will score against the varsity some day, unless the members of the latter manage to close up their line a little better. Big openings last night enabled the scrubs to go through for two three and five yards, but it didn't last long and the scrubs came off the field the losers by three touchdowns. The scrubs started the game by kicking off to "Cort" who failed to return. Benedict kicked 30 yards to Kaynor, who returned the compliment at the next opportunity. Bender started down the line for a touchdown, but ran against a circumstance and landed outside the line. Benedict kicked to the scrubs, who fumbled, and Cortelyou made the first touchdown.

Cotton kicked 35 yards to Bell, who returned 15. Benedict sent the pigskin down the field for 40 yards to Raynor, who made a 2 yard return. Raynor returned the kick and Bender made a star run of 20 yards, but was downed by Cotton.

The second half, Tobin for the varsity, kicked off to the scrubs' five yard line. On the third down with 10 yards to gain, they kicked out to Bender, who made a small return and a series of successful plays landed the ball behind the line.

Tobin again kicked off to the 5 yard line and then the college team began to play ball. Myers made a 5 yard return and soon 5 yards more was added on the third down. A gain of 5 yards for offside play followed and then another 5 yards on line bucks. At this period of the game the ball was fumbled, but recovered with a small gain and another 5 yards followed. Then came a loss of 3 yards on an attempted end run and the scrubs were forced to kick. Mikel made 20 yards and soon the ball was placed on the line for the third touchdown.

The 1st squad was increased by the addition of Marsh, who played left tackle. Cortelyou played end, Thorpe was on the field, but did not get into the game.

The game from Grinnell will be played tomorrow afternoon. The Iowa men are good players and a good game is promised.

## ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

**Large Crowd Attends—Coaches and Captain Speak—Interest Aroused for Grinnell Game.**

There were yells, songs, speeches and applause at the mass meeting yesterday; all in the interest of football. Prof. Wyer had charge of the meeting and Mr. Starr led the singing. The team and coaches were present and occupied seats on the rostrum. Dean Bessey in introducing Mr. Wyer, said the latter had come to preach the gospel of enthusiasm, and this fact was emphasized throughout the meeting.

The master of ceremonies gave the signal for the university yell, and the students responded with a spirit that was admirable. Assistant Coach Palmer was then introduced. Mr. Palmer said a team could accomplish anything if it had the proper spirit. He was a member of the Grinnell team several years ago, and although the men were light they defeated Minnesota on her own grounds. He felt confident that Nebraska could defeat the Gophers if the team was given the proper support. The speaker said he was a Nebraskan for the present and would do all in his power to defeat Minnesota.

The students then sang another song after which Coach Booth was introduced. The coach said the team had more spirit than ever before, and that the men would win games when they knew that the university was behind them. What is needed is more organized rooting. Those who were not in the game could not realize what a help good rooting was. The men on the bleachers could aid in winning games if they would get out and cheer at the proper times. The speaker urged those present to get out and watch the practice, to cheer when good plays were made, and encourage the men. He commended the scrubs for the enthusiasm and zeal which they have manifested. There was just as much honor in playing on the second eleven as in playing on the first, said Mr. Booth. Without a good scrub team you can not have a good varsity team.

Captain Westover was called for and spoke for a few minutes in an earnest manner. He urged the students to support the team; a team that had more spirit than any team which had represented this institution in several years. The men worked hard, said he. They did not have to be coaxed, and he felt certain that they would win the games if the students would do their part.

Mr. Wyer then spoke of the coming game with Minnesota. He said the railroads had made a rate of \$8, provided 250 would go. Many more than that number would attend the game, but he suggested that those intending to go leave their names in order that the management might have some
