The semi-annual spell-down of the girls "gym" classes will take place in two weeks.

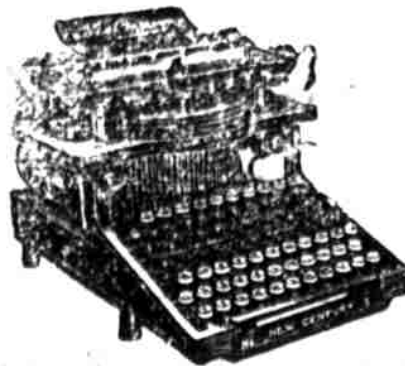
The Junior law examination in Blackstone's Commentaries will be held one week from next Wednesday.
