## A FIFTH COMPANY.

New Orders Create a New Cadet Company.

The following orders, with reference to new courses and a fifth company, were read last night before the University battalion:

GENERAL ORDERS NO.
Cadets who have had four semesters of drill and who desire to take one of the three elective courses offered this semester should report to the commandant at his office tomorrow (Friday) at 5 p . m., so that arrangements may be made in regrad to the same. This only refers to cadets who have completed their required drill. Cadets who have not had four semesters of drill and who are now drilling in the battalion are cautioned to take the theoretical course prescribed for them as a fallure in this matter wim result in their millitary work for the semester being declared unsatisfactory."

GENERAL ORDER NO. 5
"For this semester only a fifth company ( $\mathbf{E}$ ) is hereby established in the battalion. The purposes for which this company is credited is to eliminate from the different companies of the battalion cadets who are not proficient in drill, who are continuously absent or for any other reason.
"The captaing of companles A, B, C and D will submit to the commandant by Monday evening, the 9th inst., the namés of all cadets in their companies in excess of 71 men for transfer to company E. The cadets so transferred
may, upon obtaining profictency and upon application to the commandant, be tranaferred back to the original companies. Company E will not partielpate in any parade or other formation with the other compantes of the battalion. The company is formed for the purpose of drill only. Major Hall will asaume temporary command of company E.
