Report on College Settlement Contributions. More Needed.

The list of names of students who have contributed to the support of the college settlement appears below. It may be that some names have been omitted, but care has been taken to make the list as complete as material at hand will permit. Several names appear as subscribers who are not marked "paid," so they have been omitted. The list contains 152 names, with a total contribution of \$39.45. The collectors have, however, reported \$40.80, showing that the list is not quite complete.

There have been 1,349 incidental fees paid this semester. There are about 170 laws who pay no incidental fees. Hence there are about 1,520 students now on the campus. Of these, 150 have made a contribution to the work of the College Settlement. If the remaining 1,350 or more students will now send 10 cents each to the Daily Nebraskan or to Professors Taylor, Hill, Grumann or Caldwell, our treasury will be enriched \$135.00, and you will all be helpers in a good cause.
