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Doubt Out.

Interstate debate work received a setback yesterday by the resignation, on account of ill-health, of one of the three old debaters from last year, John C. Doubt, a member of the Colorado team this year. His withdrawal was announced by the following bulletin signed by Professors Taylor, Ross and Fogg:

"With regret the committee announces that, on account of ill health Mr. John C. Doubt withdraws from the Colorado team. Mr. J. N. Norton is, in consequence, appointed in his place."

Mr. Doubt was kept out of college the first half of February by an attack of articular rheumatism, from which he has not yet recovered. Because of the time he has already lost in preparing for the debate and because his physician can give him no assurance that he may not be disabled by another attack, Mr. Doubt withdraws to protect the interests of the University.

The officials in charge of the debates feel that the withdrawal of Mr. Doubt, is very regrettable. He served the University with honor in the reciprocity debate with Kansas last April.

Mr. Norton, who takes his place, is a member of the class of 1903. He has made his mark in the courses in debate last year and this. Mr. Norton also has a leading part in the senior play, "The Rivals," but will concentrate his attention for the present upon preparation for the Colorado contest.
