**Missouri Fellowships Open.**

The executive office is in receipt of the following communication from the University of Missouri, which may interest students intending to apply for outside fellowships:

Columbia, Mo., Feb. 16, 1903.

Dear Sir—The University of Missouri will offer for the next academic year a number of fellowships yielding stipends of \$200. This sum will nearly pay a student's necessary expenses in Columbia. These fellowships will be assigned to the applicants who are of highest promise in scholarship irrespective of the lines of work they may desire to pursue. It is expected that fellows will be prepared for graduate work and that they will devote themselves mainly to work in one department. They will do no teaching, but may be called upon to render a limited amount of service to the University in other ways. Will you kindly bring this matter to the attention of such students in your institution as you consider qualified for these fellowships. Applications should be on file here not later than April 1.
