Basket Ball Condemned. (Michigan Datly.)
Basket ball, the great athletic sport for women, has been placed under the ban, says the New York World. A wave of protest has arisen in various woman's colleges.
The ground for disapprow are that Illness and deformities result from violent playing. and that when young vomen who have played the game in schools where a close watch has not
been kept upon the progress of the sport enter college the physical condi tion is such as to render them unfit to ope with the routine of college life. A prominent educator and athlet who is opposed to basket ball said
"Unless the game is played unde strict supervision the greatest harm may come from it. It is equally as bad as football. Girls enter into the game with all the ferocity and animal ism of football players. From a health ul exercise it has degenerated into barbarous contest. If teachers can regulate and superintend athletics am in favor of it to a certain degree but basket ball has assumed an alarm ing phase of late.
"Basket ball is more injurious and rougher than football on girls. One of the brightest girls of my acquaint ance is now unable to attend schoo as the result of injuries received in a basket ball game. The girls knock each other down push each other about get thelr breath bumped out of them lose their self-control and behave lik young animals. Girls seem less able to keep within bounds than boys.
"It is positively brutal," said a prom nent physician, "to allow girls to play basket ball to excess. Like all exercise. it is all right in a mild form, but the trouble lies in the fact that it is game that can not be played in modera thon. The opportunities for brutality are powerful, and girls become so ener getic in the sport that they forget al the principles of health and physica aw. The tearing and pulling. twist ing and falling, result most serfously nd I have had case after case wher girl has been made an invalid through this immoderate sport. Basket ball is not a good game for women. It is too rough. Women are too delicately con structed to be subjected to the rough mauling and pounding in basket ball.
