## State Farm Notes.

The farm is putting in a new cinder aldewalk leading from Thirty-third street to the farm buildings.

Messrs. Stilson of York and Ashburn of Glbbon, farmers' Institute peakers, visited the station yesterday.

Prof. H. R. Smith and S. W. Perin, foreman of the farm, are in attendance this week upon the closing exercises of the Kansas State Agrtcultural Col ege at Manhattan.

Complaint is general out at the farm of this being such a backward spring. However, with the weather permitting. the small grain plots will be started thls week.

Chester G. Marshall, the nurseryman In the horticultural department, has resigned and will leave April 1. His place will be flled by James Carlyle formerly foreman of the Jefferson county nurseries. Mr. Carlyle wil have charge of the landscape garden ing. He is an old experienced orna mental gardener, having received his training in Scotland.

The department of animal husbandry has just published in press bulletin No. 18 the result of a pig-feeding experiment at the station. The object was to determine the relative value of al falfa, wheat shorts and skim-milk to supplement corn for fattening pigs. Twenty pigs, uniform in type, were placed in four lots of flive pigs each and were fed from December 2 to February 24 , each lot recelving differen rations. The results of the experiment show that at market prices and in the corn bring $4 c$ more per bushel, wheat shorts 8c more, and alfalfa leaves 9 more. Assuming that only 5 per cent duced in Nebraska this year is being fed to hogs as a single food, these figures would go to show that over one million dollars more wealth could be added to the state if wheat shorts or alfalfa were substituted for one-fifth of the corn fed.

Prof. T. L. Lyon, in a recent bul letin on "Macaront Wheats," records the results of 100 tests conducted in varipus parts of Nebraska, principally in the west central part of the state Seed of several varleties of macaron wheat was distributed by the United States department of agriculture hrough the Nebraska experiment sta tion, each experimenter receiving one
bushel of seed. The test was planned to cover the following points: First the productiveness of macaroni wheat as compared with other spring varieties or with winter wheat; second, the portion of the state to which it is best adapted; third, the varietles best suit
ed to growth in this region. The av erage yield of all macaroni wheat tested in 1902 was 18.3 bushels per acre. From the data at hand it is safe to say that macaroni wheats yield better than other spring varieties; but how they compare in this respect with winte wheat in western Nebraska can not b definitely stated at this time. The growing of macaroni wheat in west ern Nebraska promises to add a new and useful crop to that semi-arid region. The department has just re celved an Importation of this whea direct from Egypt. India and Arabia It will be used in an experiment sim llar to the one noted above.
