There is a name honored above all in the memory of the students and faculty alike—that of Professor Joseph Le Conte, or "Professor Joe," as he was lovingly called. He died a little over two years ago. I did not see him, as I entered after his death; but he seems almost a personal friend to me through the testimony of those who knew him and who never tire of speaking of him. Although he was one of the best scientists in the United States he had the spirit, they say, and the meekness of a little child.

Mr. Stebbins, who graduated from the Nebraska University in 1900, took his doctor's degree here this spring in astronomy.

This and Leland Stanford are the only large universities this side of the mountains. There is a great deal of rivalry in athletics and debating. The football game each year is the event of the athletic world in this region. The track contests have for eleven years been all in our favor, but this year Stanford won by a few points. In debating there is considerable interest. A medal is given each year to the best individual speaker in a contest of three men from each institution. Then there is the intercollegiate debate besides.

There is much discussion concerning co-education. It is not so popular here as in Nebraska. The boys take the lead in most affairs. The term "co-ed" and "pellcan" are used very frequently. Sentiment is growing in favor of co-education. Dr. Jordan, president of Stanford, calls it a "silly discussion."
