Burdette G. Lewis returned Wednesday night from Omaha, where he went to attend the wedding of his brother. L. S. Lewis.


Miss Jean McGeachin, '06, left yesterday for her home at Orleans, Neb. She was compelled to leave on account of ill health.

The usual weekly recital by the students of the School of Music will be given next Saturday, Oct. 10, at 4 p. m, in the new chapel.






