19, seven not voting. Upon Mr. Lundin's motion the rest of the elections made last Monday were allowed to stand.

Mr. Brown took the chair and expressed a regret that a cloud had invaded the Junior skies. He hoped that complete harmony would be restored and the present unpleasantness banished from the memory of every member of the class.

Mr. Lundin in a manly speech declared that there was no ill-feeling between himself and Mr. Brown, and that he would rather give up the chair than hold it undeservedly. He believed that he was justly elected at the former election and in view of this belief he had taken the stand that he did.

Mr. Lundin was obliged to make this fight alone and stood well for his rights. The grace with which he accepted the decision of the class made it evident that he desired the right to prevail, even if a sacrifice to himself was entailed.

President Brown at once entered upon his official duties and called a meeting of the class for next Monday. At this meeting the general subject of Junior athletics will be considered and all other business as may properly come before the class. Upon motion made, seconded and carried the class adjourned after one of the most momentous and exciting class meetings in the history of the University.

Seniors to Hold Chapel Program.

The Seniors met in U. 106 yesterday morning, being called to order by President Elliott. The chief matter of consideration was in regard to securing caps and gowns. A measure was passed to the effect that if the caps and gowns can be secured before Thanksgiving the class appear in chapel upon some occasion in the insignia of their rank and position. If arrangements can be made they will probably appear in chapel on the day preceding the Thanksgiving vacation or the one immediately after it.

Upon this occasion a Senior program will be rendered. It is intended to compel the boys of the class to assume a share of this responsibility and not leave it all to the girls, as they did last year. The program last year was well planned and successfully carried out, and the Seniors promoting the undertaking feel confident that the class can do as well this year. There may be some difficulty in persuading the members of the class to be prompt in securing their regalia, as last year this matter was neglected by many and allowed to drag through a space of months. But if those in favor of the plan proposed push the work energetically they will succeed in rousing the class to their true sense of duty.

Good Service Rendered by the Daily Star.

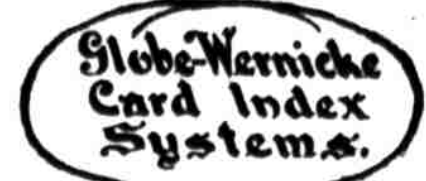
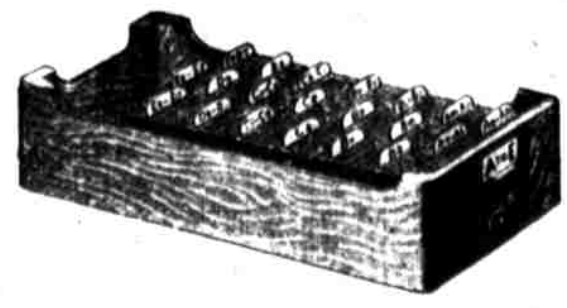
