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## Editorial Remarks

All students intending to take advantage of the excursion rates offered to Lawrence should make their intentions known as soon as possible. Promptness is urged in this matter, as those in charge of the necessary arrangements will be enabled to work to better advantage in making their estimates. While little trouble is expected in securing the 166 names necessary it is desirable that all should be expeditious in registering, for if this number is exceeded additional allowances must be made in arranging the excursion.

The team that will line up against Nebraska on Iowa field next Saturday is, according to the reports that are forthcoming, much stronger than the one that met Minnesota. Some new material has turned out for practice, which together with the old men who have been training hard for the past two weeks, will make a combination that seems strong indeed. The Iowa students are recovering from the disappointment over their team's defeat, and will turn out in force to witness Saturday's game. Excursions have been planned from many points in the state, and the game is regarded in its true light, as one of the biggest that will be seen on Iowa field this year.

The Iowa management seems desirous of according the Nebraska team a fitting reception, and the following editorial in the Daily Iowan gives a comfortable assurance that they may expect the best of treatment:

"Nebraska need fear no rowdiness this year while with us. Preparations have been made to give her a cordial welcome. Whether we win or lose she will be our guest. Many of our old students and friends are among the Nebraskans."

The introduction of cross country runs in this University brings in a feature that has acquired great popularity in eastern colleges. In some of them great interest is displayed and a multitude of students turn out and take part. Steeplechase contests are held regularly between different institutions. In the west, however, these cross country runs are a new thing, but there is no reason why they should not become popular and be firmly established when more is known of them. The exercise is wonderful for the results that it produces; for it develops powers of endurance not only in running, but in the pursuit of many branches of work. While the general tendency is toward physical development, it affords a training in long distance running that is much better than can be acquired on a limited and enclosed track. While, of course, only

a mere beginning is being made now, it is expected that interest will grow until this new feature of cross country running becomes firmly established here as a leading and popular form of exercise.

### Will Hold Afternoon Meetings.

The city and University Y. M. C. A. societies will continue this year the Sunday afternoon meetings which have proved so popular in the past. Large committees have been appointed to arrange for these meetings, which will be initiated next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Oliver theatre. The services of an accomplished speaker will be obtained and music will be furnished by Prof. Wilbur Starr, formerly of the University Conservatory of Music, and by the Conservatory Male quartet.

Elaborate plans are also being made for the Wednesday evening prayer meetings at the association rooms. These meetings are especially and entirely for college men and will prove of great help and interest. Secretary Ringer extends a cordial invitation to all University men to attend them.

### A Quiz Section.
