In a fast game of basket ball last night the Methodist boys from University Place defeated the Law team 23 to 7.

In the first half Fordyce of Wesleyan made the pretty plays for the Wesleyans, while Corlitt took the honors for the Laws. At the end of the first half the score stood 14 to 5 in favor of Wesleyan.

In the second half the Laws got together better and improved very much over their playing in the first half, but they were clearly outclassed by the Methodists. Lowell threw most of the goals in the second half. The weakness of the Law team lay principally in the fact that they did not play together and showed more lack of team practice than any fault of individual playing. The first University team will meet the Wesleyan team Tuesday evening in the Armory.

**Pedogogical Club Meets.**

The Pedogogical club held an interesting meeting last evening which drew a substantial number of students, who are preparing to take teachers' certificates this year, and some visitors.

The plan is to make the meeting the occasion for social converse so that members may get better acquainted, and to present practical topics, which will influence the teachers' professional life, and particularly to present in a vivid manner the characteristics which make for or against a teacher in securing and holding a position. Dr. Luckey gave one of his suggestive talks last evening, beginning with the thought that each individual leads a double life, one for self, and one for the race, which he illustrated with some detail. He applied it to the choice of a profession in which one can be happy, progressive and truly serviceable. He proceeded to speak of the profession of teaching, first in the broad sense of the word in which we are all teachers, then in a more restricted sense of a school teacher. In this connection he spoke of some of the characteristic qualities requisite for the teacher, and some of the teacher's needs and ended with some very interesting and suggestive personal experiences. The next meeting of the club will be held soon after the holidays.

on their 30-yard line and time was called immediately.

For the Seniors, Hazen, who was quarterback and field captain, showed splendid generalship. Newton played an excellent game at tackle and when called back to halfback position made some of the best gains. His punting was also fine, ranging from sixty to sixty-five yards with the wind. Pritchard and McDonald did star work at the halves. Elliott hit the line well and did some effective interfering. In the line Lewis showed how a center can do more than merely snap the ball and stop the plays directed at him. He was responsible for the only score of the game and often got down the field on punts in time to stop the runner in his tracks. The work of both the Senior ends was good. Bell's running back of punts was of a particularly high order. Walton succeeded well in holding down Burns, the star tackle on the Scrub.

For the Freshmen Drain and Craig were the best ground gainers. Drain also did some good work in kicking, and could have been used more to good advantage in the first half. In the line Murphy, a man who played tackle on Doane's last year's team, was the only Freshman who outplayed his opponent. He got through on two or three occasions and got the runner behind the line. Burns played a good game, the Seniors being penalized

twice for the holding of his opponent.

Westover umpired the game. Bender was referee, and Drain head linesman.
