The beginning class in domestic science has seven students.

Professor Heald reports the work in his section as progressive and in a healthy state.

A class in general bacteriology with a registration of nine students was started this semester.

The organic chemistry class will study the chemical composition of mixed compounds next week.

The class in chemistry 2 has begun its work in examining the properties of the aluminum compounds.

Chancellor Andrews gave a talk before the high school students Thursday in behalf of their debating society.

The department of Romance languages has just received about ninety books to be used in laboratory assignments.

The class in meteorology has begun to study atmospheric temperatures and will soon be able to predict weather.

The students in chemistry B have finished their study of non-metallic elements and next week they will begin their work on metals.

The students in physiological chemistry is beginning to study digestion in a chemical way. It is taking saliva for its study at present.

There are between twenty and thirty students in the geography class which meets on Saturday forenoon. Among these are several of the principals of ward schools in Lincoln.

The Historical Society is preparing some of the old Spanish and Indian documents and grants for the St. Louis exposition. There are six of these pertaining to the Omaha tribe.

The class in English literature 6 under Professor Stupp, will finish its work on Barrie's "The Little Minister," next Wednesday, and will have an examination on the subject next Friday.

Miss Barbour reports some excellent receipts for the St. Louis exposition from teachers all over the state, among the being good pictures of sod school houses from Butler county, and many other interesting photographs.

Dr. Condra received a commendatory receipt of his bulletin to the United State of his survey work last summer in Nebraska, with an invitation to resume the work next summer. This speaks very highly for the work of Dr. Condra.

The faculty of the Industrial College meets Saturday February 13, at 4 p. m., followed by a meeting of the college of Literature, Science and Arts. The faculty of the graduate school meets immediately after the meeting of the college of Literature Science and Arts.

W. H. Woodruff of the geological department has just completed an excellent piece of work on the map of Cass county. The beginning of this work was to topograph the country, which is an immense amount of tedious labor, and later he cut the cast to mould the plan from which the maps will be photographed, giving an accurate account of the geography of the county.

Miss Cora Conklin gave a talk in Tecumseh Thursday evening before the Johnson County Farmers' institute of that city. The subject of her talk was, "Glimpses of Spain."

Miss Rosa Bouton made a lecture trip Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Wednesday she gave two lectures before the Pawnee Farmers' institute, and incidentally, a short address before the students of the Pawnee high school. Thursday she appeared before the Farmers' institute at Tecumseh and talked on the division of finance in the home.
