WILL MEET TODAY

Board Will Locate Administration And Physics Buildings.

The fate of the athletic field will be decided today. The building committee of the Board of Regents is now in session, trying to devise some means for solving the question of the location of the new physics building. It is probable that this will be upon the atnietic field, but the plans may be so changed as to permit enough space being reserved to still allow athletics to hold sway at the University of Nebraska.

Superintendent of Construction Chowins stated this much to a Nebraskan reporter, in an interview yesterday afternoon. He continued: "The plans may be altered by cutting off ten feet from the north wing of the building instead of making the proposed addition. This, it is thought, would leave sufficient space for the football field. The Regents are just as anxious as

The plans for the new Administration building are now at the office of the superintendent of constructoan, and while they will be subject to several minor changes, practically represent the building as it will be constructed.

The structure will be two stories in height, with a basement. From the ground to the first floor line it will be built of cut stone. Sand brick will be used from that point to the caps of the second story, when stone will again be employed. The general plan of construction will be modeled according to the Renaissance style. Three entrances, on the east, west and south, will be furnished, but the former two will open on the main hall. This will be floored with marble and Mosaics. The stairways leading to the second floor will also be of marble. A handsome driveway for carriages will be situated at the south front of the new building.

The basement will be rather shallow, being only five feet below the ground. It will contain vaults, store and janitors' rooms. The vaults will extend to the second floor. All records will be store in the basement vaults. while papers and books in immediate use will be deposited in the other floors. 
