**A FENCE PUT UP.**

**Students Wouldn't Keep Off the Grass Until Made To.**

A marked (in green) improvement has just been made on the campus. A very substantial board fence, about so high by so long has put in an appearance in the pretty grass plot in the front of the library. As a fence the structure is above reproach.
