**VARIED INTERESTS**

**Prospects for the Organization of  
the Various Class Teams.**

As the season advances it behooves the classes to trot out their baseball teams. The Senior class has begun the good work, and if a manager can win a game of baseball the Seniors will certainly have a walk-away in the race for the championship. The other classes should follow the example already set by appointing either baseball managers or committees, in order that a schedule may be arranged and the men set to work. Both football and basketball have been very successful this year, and four teams have always been in the race with a will, which has developed more class feeling than a dozen rough-houses on the campus, and it is to be hoped that the classes will not let the baseball season end in the grand fizzle we witnessed last year. Baseball has this advantage over football and basket ball. That since it is not as severe as the former and does not require a building as does the latter, a schedule of games can be played and the championship determined by percentage instead of having the teams pair off and the winners play for the pennant. The former method is much more just to the teams, who thus meet every other one, and a longer season is afforded. If every team played every other one twice it would necessitate a schedule of twelve games, which should not be too long for a month's playing.

The only successful baseball league last year was the inter-fraternity, and nothing seems to have been heard of that this year. Its success last year should insure its renewal and the fraternities will probably form their teams before very long.

The law school team has not organized as yet, but there will doubtless be one this season which will equal the record made by the team turned out by that school last year. The Medics have decided to enter the University athletic circle with a team of champions this year, and they solemnly promise The Nebraskan that they will be heard from later. As reported in yesterday's Nebraskan, the state farm has a team which has already started the season with a spurt by defeating the Lincoln high school team. Considering all these teams, it will be quite a riddle to pick the University champions even after the class championship has been decided.

Another department of athletics which will engage the attention of classes is track work. Dr. Clapp is considering the advisability of having an inter-class field meet in May. This will be a new departure at Nebraska and promises to be popular from the first. Last year the only field event between classes was a relay race between the Freshmen and Sophomores, won by the former. With classes as large as they are at this school there should be no difficulty in each class presenting a team of ten men, especially when the regular track team squad numbers over twenty men, and this is only a small part of those who would go into track work but are prevented from trying for a place on the University team by lack of time or the thought that there is "no use." If this field day is made possible it would doubtless result in more class enthusiasm than any other sport, as track work is always extremely popular.
