SPLENDID EULOGY

Brown University Honors Chancellor Andrews.

Great Celebration at the Unveiling of "Benny's" Portrait.

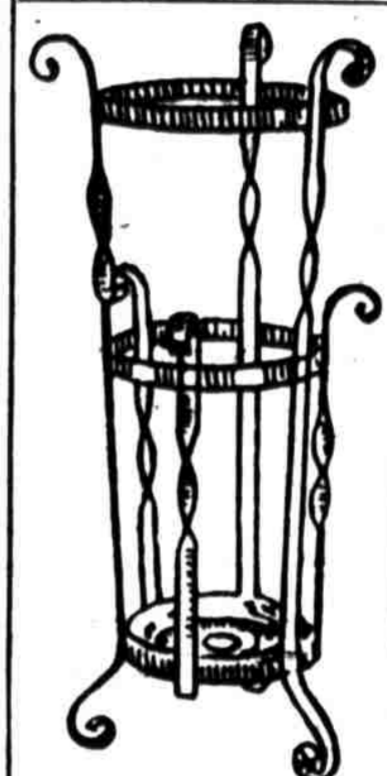
The following article, which will be of paramount interest to every Nebraskan, appeared in an early number of the Boston Transcript:

"The great event for Brown alumni of yesterday's commencement exercises was not the degree giving nor the speech making, but the unveiling of the portrait of Brown's former president, 'Benny' Andrews, '70, now chancellor of the University of Nebraska, professor at Brown from '82 to '88 and president from '89 to '98. The portrait, costing more than \$1,000, is the work of William M. Chase of New York, and is the gift of the class of '93, the first to be graduated under Dr. Andrews' administration.

"The scene at the unveiling was most impressive. The gift was presented in behalf of the class by its president, Dean Alexander Meikeljohn, whose eulogy deeply stirred the men who had sat under Andrews as teacher and president. 'Classes,' said Dean Meikeljohn, 'would have fought for the privilege of making this gift; but we were "Benny's" first freshmen.' It was as the great man that the dean eulogized the hero of twenty years of Brown students. 'I wish,' said he, 'that I could bring every future freshman before this portrait and let him behold a man and say to him, "If there is any man-

hood in you, look at him and he will see it. If there is any meanness in you, he will see it and shame you out of it."

"When Dean Meikeljohn finished and the features of 'Benny' were disclosed, the audience rose with one long cheer, or rather yell, which was followed by class cheers in succession. In the suffused eyes of class mates in '70 and of a long line of men who as students had been inspired by him, the affection for Dr. Andrews was clearly written. Graduates of fifty years say they never saw such a tribute paid at Brown. At the president's reception in Sayles hall last night everyone tarried before the picture.

"The classes from '90 to 1903, inclusive, which attended the commencement dinner in the gymnasium, sent this message to Dr. Andrews through M. M. Fogg, '94, a professor at the University of Nebraska, who had brought Dr. Andrews' greeting: "Tell Benny," said Colonel H. Anthony Dyer, '94, the chairman, 'that so long as the light he lit on this hill shall burn, we shall hold in our hearts him who made Brown into a great institution, bound the students to him, and, though dispensing stern justice, became the most beloved college president in the east. What Andrews, the man, means to Brown men appears from Dean Meikeljohn's eulogy, which is reproduced here in full from the Providence Journal:

"Mr. President: I rise on behalf of the class of '93, to present to the university a portrait of President Andrews. Classes would have fought for the privilege which we enjoy today, but no class could have claimed it with so good a right. We were his first
