WILL LEAVE TODAY

Foot Ball Men Start This Afternoon for Colorado.

A Hard Game is Assured.—Colorado is Reported Very Strong.

This afternoon at 3:20 the team leaves for Colorado from the Rock Island station.

Colorado last Saturday defeated the University of Utah 33-6, Utah's score being made on a fumble and a resulting 105-yard run. The game is described as one of eleven men together against eleven individual players, with the usual result.

The Colorado papers are devoting a good deal of space toward showing on paper that Nebraska's overconfidence, together with Colorado's real ability, will result in the defeat of the Cornhuskers. A hard game awaits the varsity out in Boulder. This much is certain. But it's the hard games that Nebraska has a peculiar habit of winning. But the students should not let the team do it all. Every victory this year should be one of the whole school. We can't cheer the scarlet and cream on at every game, but we can always give the team a good send-off. This afternoon at 3:20 at the Rock Island depot the varsity leaves for a game that will try Nebraska's grit to the utmost. Let every one be at the station to cheer the team. A good send-off is half the battle, and this that we can do is certainly up to us to do.

After putting the varsity squad, composed of Mills, Borg, Barta, Bender, Benedict, Eager, Weller, Burns, Robertson, Johnson, Speer, Standeven, Glen, Cy Mason, Fenlon, Barwick, Marsh, Cotton, Denslow and Richardson, through signal practice and a good drill in the fine points, Coach Booth sent the scrubs against them for a good scrimmage. Gains were consistent, if not very long. The right side of the varsity line still shows too much weakness, though this may be overestimated, as the left wing of the scrubs is stronger.

CROSS COUNTRY RUNNING.

Men are to Begin Work This Afternoon.

Tomorrow evening at 5 o'clock the cross country men will take their first run. Added interest is being taken this fall in cross country running for Nebraska is to be represented by a five-man team at the cross country championship run in the Olympic games at St. Louis November 17. The run on that date is to be eight miles in length, one on the track, six cross country and the finish on the track. The first five finishing score for the winning team United States championship medals will be awarded teams in first, second and third places. Runners from Greece, France and England will compete with the collegians of America. All places on this team are yet open. Tomorrow will be the first run and until then no idea can be had of the material available.

Another event which has given an impetus to cross country running is the annual run of the Western Cross Country association, of which Herbert States is treasurer, which occurs at Chicago on Thanksgiving. Nebraska will be represented at this run, which is five miles in length, by a team of

SENIORS TO MEET

Most Important Class Election of Semester This Morning.

Fred Hunter is at Present the Favorite for President.

The Seniors will meet at convocation period this morning in Memorial Hall for the election of officers. Politicians of the class were busy all day yesterday, with the result that the end of the contest for the presidency can be predicted this morning with reasonable certainty. Yesterday afternoon the candidacy of Mr. Fred Hunter was announced, and this was soon followed by the withdrawal of Mr. W. J. Woods, who had been the most prominent of the men seeking the place.

Notwithstanding the boom of Mr. Hunter, and the withdrawal of Mr. Woods, it is possible that some other candidate will spring a surprise on the meeting. A number of possibilities for the place are available, and at the time of our going to press, Mr. Hunter's election is by no means assured. He is, however, by far the most probable choice. No candidates for the remaining offices have been announced.

The presidency of the Senior class is considered the most important class office to be secured, and interest in the result of this morning's election exceeds even that shown in the deliberations of the Freshmen. The full membership of the class is expected to be on hand.

WILL BE SUCCESS.

Junior Cap Hop is Already The Talk of the Day.

The Junior cap hop next Friday night is proving a source of much interest on the campus and the success of the enterprise seems already assured. The announcement in The Nebraskan last Monday that A. G. Schreiber and Cy Mason would pose in the act that has gained such celebrity for them—"Holding the Sack"—proved a great sensation. Mr. Mason in an interview with a representative of The Nebraskan last night stated, however, that he feared this would have to be declared off, on account of the tremendous advance sale of tickets. This, he said, would make the performance too laborious for one man, and his own absence in Colorado would make the whole job devolve on Mr. Schreiber. At the cost of sacrificing his position on the football team, Mr. Mason fears that he could not arrange to be present at the hop, but he has arranged with Mr. Butch Hunter, who has had much experience in similar enterprises, to take his place. Mr. Schreiber expresses himself as being satisfied with this arrangement, although deeply deploring the loss of Mr. Mason's companionship.
