DR. BESSEY TALKS.

Gives an Interesting Lecture at Convocation.

Dr. Bessey, whose lectures are always interesting and instructive, occupied the convocation period yesterday, before a large body of the university students and faculty. The subject upon which he talked was his "Summer Vacation Trip," which consisted of an extended journey through the British-American possessions, with Winnipeg, Canada, as a starting point, and thence west over the Rockies to the coast, and back across the territory of the states.

One of the interesting things of the lecture was his description of the Columbia River, which he crossed on this tour. He gave out a vivid and impressive word picture of the landscape that is taken in by it, which, as he says, makes a large section of country in the loop formed that is very dry and in some instances barren.

Vancouver Island was another of the places visited by Dr. Bessey and also the capital city of Columbia, Victoria, which is located there near the mouth of the river. On his return home many of the points of historic note and interest were visited, one of them in particular being the famous Pike's Peak.

The talk throughout was accorded close attention by the audience, and was intensely interesting.
