*In Other Colleges*

Two new buildings will be erected at Minnesota in place of the one which was destroyed by fire last week.

A political census of student voters is being taken at Michigan. This census will be used by the national committee in their work of sending the students home to vote.

The registration at Yale this year is noticeably less than that of 1903. The enrollment in the scientific department is greater than heretofore, but the academic department is considerably less.

An interesting part of the ceremonies at Columbia anniversary will be the laying of the cornerstones of the two new dormitories, now being erected. Each building will be nine stories high and contain 300 rooms.

Two great western athletic contests will take place this year in Chicago on Thanksgiving day. Besides the football game in the afternoon, a cross-country race in which nearly all colleges of athletic repute in the west will enter men, will be held in the morning.—Cornell Daily Sun.

The University of Michigan's new engineering building will soon be completed and will rank as one of the finest of its kind. Its cost is over \$150,000. A novel feature of the building is the naval tank on the first floor to be used for marine investigations, and in the study of hydraulics.

The curriculum at Princeton for the coming year has undergone many changes. The Freshmen are now required to take only prescribed work and are granted no electives. A new degree of bachelor of arts has been established. Under the new system the wholly elective work does not commence until the Junior year.

Several of the players at Miami were injured in a game with Columbus last week. In reference to the accident Professor Benton said: "I should like to see the presidents of all the colleges get together to abolish football. I favor athletics and want boys to have a good time, but football is too hazardous to be a justifiable college sport."

The steamship Irvonia sailing for Liverpool, carried 35 students, bound for Oxford College. These men represented various states in the Union and were the winners of the Cecil Rhodes scholarship for a course of study at Oxford. It was suggested by one of the winners of the prize that all sail from Boston together, and his suggestion was carried out.

The eligibility of M. A. Cadwalder to play on the Stanford Freshman team has been protested on the ground that Mr. Cadwalder was last year a student at Pomona College and a member of the track team. The intercollegiate agreement states that students from another institution of collegiate rank shall not take part in collegiate contests until they have been at the institution from which they came for at least one year. It is believed that the protest is not well founded, as Cadwalder was never a student at Pomona but took work in the preparatory department there.
