 Seniors alone shall be allowed to occupy the seats of the Memorial Gates.

 No silk hat shall be worn by any undergraduate until the Junior week of his class.

No Freshman shall smoke on the campus.
 No Freshman shall wear a straw

hat until Memorial Day. 5.—No Freshman shall carry a cane.

6. -No underclassman shall be allowed to wear preparatory school insignia.

 Seniors alone shall be allowed to occupy the middle steps of University Hall on the middle campus.

8.—No Freshman shall walk up or down the south side of College street unless his class wins from the Sophomores in the annual interclass baseball game.

Final arrangements have been made for a football game between the Stanford eleven and the team from the University of Colorado, to be played in Broadway park, Denver, on Thanksgiving Day.

The manager of the Colorado team has spared no pains in his efforts to make the game a success, and with this aim in view he has advertised the game throughout the entire state. Owing to the large number of partisans of both universities who reside in Colorado, it is expected that this will be the largest game played in that section of the country.

The University of Colorado, which is situated at Boulder, has the strongest team in the state, and has demonstrated its superiority over Nebraska in a recent match by defeating it to 0.—Daily Palo Alto.

The new six day-three hour system has been adopted at Minnesota. It was the idea of the faculty that by means of this new system the work would be distributed over six days instead of five. The method is not meeting with approval among the student body, because it necessitates such irregular classes and hours.

In consequece of recent orders from the government requiring at least five hours of drill per week from the Minnesota cadets, much excitement has been caused at that institution. If this rule is enforced extra credit will be demanded and some officers declare that they will not drill without pay for the extra hours.

Notable action has been taken at Oxford in the case of Earl Murray, who was last year awarded the Cecil Rhodes scholarship for the state of Kansas. Mr. Murray refused to become a member of the Church of England, and on these religious grounds purely his admission was refused.
