In Other Colleges

Harvard won the intercollegiate tennis championship, taking five out of six games with Columbia.

The faculty of the University of Texas have forbidden Greek letter fraternities to begin their "pledging" until November 1. Measures will be taken at that time to modify the vigor of the rushing season.

The Juniors at Michigan are returning to boyhood sports by introducing the time honored game of top spinning. The object of this is merely trading. The energetic Juniors. Some of the class have become enthusiastic and boast of twenty or thirty varieties of tops.

A number of graduates of Princeton have presented the university library with a very valuable collection, consisting of a set of law books, containing the reports of the courts of New York and other states. These books are extremely hard to get and the gift is therefore most highly prized.

The growth of Michigan, as gleaned from the annual report of Prof. Angell, is indeed encouraging to that institution. The registration is now 3,659, an increase of nearly 150 over last year. Every state in the Union except Delaware and South Carolina are represented and there are students from Japan, Mexico, Colombia, Cuba, England, Arabia, Holland, Turkey and Bulgaria.

The Boston School of Technology boasts of a new athletic field and track, to be dedicated on Field Day, November 12. With the exception of the turns, the track is a standard quarter-mile one. The width on the turns is sixteen feet, or four feet wider than the regulation. The straightaway is 135 yards in length and twenty feet in depth. The field is to be named after its generous donor, "Wiggelsworth" Field.

Robert F. Baldwin of the University of Chicago had a most narrow escape from drowning this week, and it was only by reason of his excellent swimming that his life was saved. His boat capsized early in the evening on Lake Michigan. He succeeded in swimming through the cold water to shore, but was obliged to spend the night in an open field. The Hyde Park police and the Jackson Park life saving crew spent the whole night dragging the lake for his body.

Says the Minnesota Daily: "To say that the university girls are astounded at the action taken by some of the men in college in forming an association whose members refuse to lift their hats when spoken to is to use a mild word to express the popular feeling. They cannot understand how the trouble of lifting one's hat even a dozen times a day can compare with the trouble of smiling sweetly a dozen times in the same length of time.
