Whether this charge is the result of a desire on the part of a schoolboy for notoriety, or is really based on fact. In either case it Dehooves the two institutions involved to issue some sort of a statement which
will exonerate themselves. It cannot but hurt the standing of a university in the eyes of the amateur sportsmen of the United States to permit such eharges as those made by Rheinschild to be made with no refutation. Letting such charges go unanswered is not at all wise
