BUYING A PLAYER.

Nebraska Has Much to Learn After All.

In view of the recent spasm which Nebraska has suffered, the following from "Sporting News" sounds somewhat startling. The assertions made in this article are corroborated by the Daily Californian:

"Each year the newspapers are filled with accounts of how certain preparatory school stars scheduled for one university have mysteriously found way to the football squad of a rival. Why these promising players who are expected to fill the vacancies caused by the graduation in the preceding June of various gridiron heroes, have changed their minds, has remained and doubtless will remain, a profound secret. It is a sort of scandal which is confined to no section of the country, the east being filled with disagreeable stories of this kind as well as the middle west and other sections of the country. From California has come a newspaper report of a scandal of this character which should, at least, result in an investigation by the universities whose fair names are assailed. Walter Rheinschild, of Los Angeles, one of the best academic football players in southern California, has made startling charges against both the University of Michigan and the University of Wisconsin. The Los Angeles lad, who was star tackle of his preparatory school team last year, declares openly that Manager Baird, of Michigan, offered to pay all his expenses the present season and promised remunerative employment if he would go to Ann Arbor and join the football squad there. Wisconsin, on the other hand, he alleges, offered him all traveling expenses and other remuneration if he would try for the eleven at Madison. The lad openly stated that he would accept the highest offer, pitting two of the most prominent universities of the middle west against each other in bidding for his services. Whether this charge is the result of a desire on the part of a schoolboy for notoriety, or is really based on fact, in either case it behooves the two institutions involved to issue some sort of a statement which will exonerate themselves. It cannot but hurt the standing of a university in the eyes of the amateur sportsmen of the United States to permit such charges as those made by Rheinschild to be made with no refutation. Letting such charges go unanswered is not at all wise."

Sombrero Board at Work.

The Junior sombrero board has now systematized its work and it is progressing rapidly. Mr. Wheeler and Mr. Matthewson have divided the editorial section into several departments with a staff assistant at the head of each department, and directly responsible for all matter coming under their departments. Half of the departments are under the direct supervision of Mr. Wheeler and the other half under Mr. Matthewson.
