On November 11 the largest banquet ever held at Michigan will be given by the "Michigan Union."

The Seniors at Berkely have decided to wear the cap and gown only on university days, which occur fortnightly.

A number of Minnesota men have organized a grafters club. It is their plan to "bum" their way to all the football games played outside of Minnesota.

In the republican rally recently held in Madison Square garden, a parade of 6,000 men, representing alumni of twenty-eight colleges, was a feature of the day.

The question of making election day a college holiday is being agitated at Cornell. It is urged that a large number of students who return home to vote, whether or not university work is suspended.

Plans are being made for the opening of a college at Johnston City, Tenn., for people who were not able to get a college education when young. A number of elderly men and women have registered as Freshmen.

Letters have been received from University of Cincinnati and from Brown University asking for blank-giving games with Michigan. At present Brown seems the most eligible, but no definite plans have been made.

A new macadamized road will soon be built through the Californian University campus. It is expected that the construction will afford a valuable object lesson to the students in engineering, as well as an example to municipal authorities in modern street improvement.

There is a novel presidential campaign going on at Vassar. Campaign committees have been appointed, headquarters established and ward workers are "hustling" votes. The college has been divided into wards and about 1,000 students have registered. Republican and democratic stump speakers are in evidence and all the machinery of the election is at work.

The Senior college annual of the University of Chicago has frustrated an attempt to establish an honor system of examination. Their justification for this act has been expressed by saying, "If students were observed to be guilty of dishonesty, the college man's code of honor would prevent this being reported to the faculty. The honor system would thus defeat its own purpose."

The state museum has just received from E. A. Barbour, some beautiful pine cones, together with specimens of the bark of the sugar pine of Southern California. These were collected and donated by Mr. Barbour, U. of N. '93, now at Ft. Seward, California. The largest cone is thirteen inches long and twenty inches in circumference. The bark is from six to eight inches thick.
