*In Other Colleges*

The dedication of the new chapel at Vassar last week was attended with impressive ceremonies. The chapel is the gift of two alumni of Vassar.

Cornell has provided a training table for the freshmen football squad this year. The experiment has thus far proved a decided success. Fourteen men are present at the table.

Hereafter all undergraduates at Annapolis using tobacco will be expelled. Only first classmen at the naval academy are permitted the use of the weed and even then the use is surrounded by numerous restrictions.

The men at the law school at Chicago presented a petition to the council asking that the women students be prohibited the use of the law library. The men declare that the girls prevent serious work in the library.

The chancellor of Syracuse university announced in chapel last week that students are hereafter absolutely forbidden to hold or attend dances. His remarks have caused great excitement at the university. The chancellor asserts that dancing and dances are injurious to scholarship and study.

This year the journalism class at Michigan will have a chance at practical journalism. They will get out a newspaper called "The Sun" and preparations are now being made for the first issue. The work will probably deal only with the literary side of journalism. The edition will be limited to 200 copies.

Based upon a recent decision of the committee on employment for students at Columbia university has just handed in its report for the year closing May 31, 1904. The total amount earned by the students with the aid of the committee was \$27,452.10, without their aid, \$45,568.07.

The ways in which the students earned money is most interesting. The occupations vary from bell boy, laborer and conductor, to tutoring, life-insurance soliciting, and newspaper reporting.

Based upon a recent decision by the appellate division of the state supreme court denying the right of non-resident students to vote in the districts where they attend college, legal proceedings are to be instituted at the instance of a political club at Columbia university to mandamus the boards of registry and compel them to strike each student's name from the official list of voters.

There are two thousand voters attending Columbia. Half of them are legally empowered to vote by actual residence in this city. But the other half are likely to be denied a vote under the appellate division ruling, in which all the justices of that court concurred.

If the mandamus campaign is extended to all the colleges of the state, many thousands of votes will be lost.

Persistent efforts are being made by a large body of the law students to induce their brethren to remove their mustaches. Nearly all of these whose upper lips are unadorned by any hirsute growth have joined in the movement and they constitute a decided majority. At a recent meeting they decided that the offenders should be given until November 8, election day, in which to remove the nuisance, which they maintain is conducive to unsanitary conditions in the department.

Any who disregard this warning, they say, will immediately thereafter be summarily dealt with.

We have heard a good many express their surprise that this movement should have originated in the department where co-eds are completely in the minority.—Cornell Daily Sun.
