In his talk before the association on Sunday afternoon Dr. Stein brought out the apparent indifference to spiritual things on the part of people today. He mentioned the three-fold nature of man and called attention to the fact that the intellectual and even the physical are oftentimes developed to the neglect of the spiritual.

There were three reasons given for this. (1.) This is an age of specialists when men strive for perfection along one line. (2.) The spirit of commercialism has so pervaded the lives of men that all else is forgotten in the wild rush for wealth. (3.) Atrophy always arises from disuse. This last was especially impressed that a talent, a mind, one spiritual life allowed to fall into disuse will soon become useless.

Dr. Stein's talk was most helpful and interesting and the meeting was one of the best so far held.
