HARVARD AWARDS.

System of Athletic Awards in Effect at Eastern School.

The arrangement at Harvard of awards, such as sweaters, caps, etc., has been revised as follows:

Sweaters and unframed pictures shall be given to each head coach; to members of the university football and baseball crews, track and hockey organizations who are entitled to wear the "H"; to members of the freshman football, baseball and crew organizations who are entitled to class numerals; and also sweaters to members of the second football teams, not to exceed 20, and second baseball teams, not to exceed 15, indicated by the head coaches. In the case of the university teams the respective managers shall be authorized to include the cost of these remembrances as part of the legitimate expenses of their teams, but in the case of the freshman teams, which are expected to be self-supporting, the respective deficits must be made good by contribution from the class concerned.

The members of teams in the minor sports who are entitled to wear the "H" awarded in those sports may also receive the sweaters and unframed pictures as above indicated, provided that such awards be paid for without the management incurring any deficit.

As regards cups or medals, the committee authorizes the following practice, which has heretofore prevailed:

1. Cups for the winners in the graded crew and class races.
2. Bronze medals for first place winners in the freshman, interclass and all extra track meets; also for hare and hound contests. Gold medals are to be given for broken records.
3. Cups or medals for the winners in singles and doubles in the fall and spring tennis tournaments.
4. For the Letter cup baseball series cups have already been provided from outside sources.
5. For members of the university football teams cups or miniature footballs are not furnished by the athletic committee, but have occasionally been provided from outside sources.
6. Hatbands may be given each season to members of the university and freshman football and baseball crews and university track organizations. Selection shall be the same as in the case of sweaters already mentioned.

L. L. Harter who graduated a couple of years ago, and who is now one of the botanical investigators in the bureau of plant industry in Washington, has nearly completed a thesis for the master's degree on "The Variation of Wheat Varieties in Toxic Salt Solutions." He has been at the university the past month working upon it, under direction of Professor Bessey. Two additional bundles of botanical specimens, aggregating about 300 species were received by the department of botany last week. They will be added to the Herbarium as soon as they can be mounted.
