Editorial Remarks

What is the matter with Nebraska's loyalty? Was there, after all, some truth in Coach Booth's statement that we don't know what college spirit is. It seemed for a time that we had disproved this, once for all, but such seems not to be the case now. When roused to a high pitch of emotion by a great battle, like that in Boulder, or like that in Minneapolis, it is not hard to show the result of one's feelings, and at such times the real crucial test of college spirit does not come. The true trial of loyalty comes when nothing exciting has happened for some time; when the football team has been doing just what we expect them to do, but not anything more, when they are practicing, night after night, taking hard knocks and sharp words, and working hard all the time. Then we are apt to lose some of the close interest and to forget for the moment, that this is just the time that the team needs us, needs our spirit, and our loyalty. Right now is the time when we ought to buck up and show the team that we are still with them. Probably, after the manner in which we have received them already this year, they will not forget that we are lack of them. But it is up to us to see that they are constantly reminded of the fact. This trip to Kansas City is the only one we will have to take with the team; the only time when Nebraska rooters will have an opportunity to match their wind power with the sturdy rooters of other schools, and this is the time when we should every one of us make up our minds to go to Kansas City and share in Nebraska's victory over the Indians.
