LABOR DISCUSSION.

tion is a tendency toward liberty, but at all time to live we must labor. Labor is that which is put forth for the production of material things and all laborers should be rewarded in due proportions. Some men receive what they do not produce on account of land being in the hands of a few."

Here Mr. White explained the theory of Henry George's proposition which he gave in the following substance:

"His idea was to stop taxing the industries and to tax the rents which will give us the privilege of enjoying what we produce. There are only three ways of getting at a dollar, to earn, beg or steal it. To earn a million dollars at \$5.00 per day would take over 600 years; but we have plenty of millionaires. They must either be over 600 years old or have been given their money or else have stolen it, for it is an impossibility for them to earn it only by the laws which make it possible for one man to get what he does not earn, and not another earn what he does not get. We claim that the whole result is due to the ground rent."

Mr. White had little trouble from the very beginning in holding the closest attention of his hearers. His deep, rich, magniloquent voice and the earnestness of his efforts commanded unusual attention to his words.

Taking the address all in all from the expressions of those who heard it, which is a valid test, it was worthy of much praise and commendation and was adjudged as masterly a product as has been given in chapel this year.

The senior football team will play its first game with the Lincoln academy this afternoon at 1:30. The senior team is always handicapped by the fact that there are so few men in the class by the time that it reaches the last stretch, and as a rule these few men are not noted as athletes, but they always try to make up in spirit what they lack in science, and are determined to make a good race for the university championship this year. President Hunter has been inculcating the game into the aspirants, and if he is as successful with his class as he is with the high school, success is certain.

The fact that the laws at last gained admission to the Interclass Athletic board has added zest to the daily practice of the teams. This year there will be but two teams, a freshman and a junior, for there are only a few seniors—merely those who for some strange reason decided to remain behind when their class graduated last year. The exact date for the great game has not been decided upon yet, but it will be within the next ten days, and a hard, bitter game is expected, for both classes are decided in the opinion that it is going to be the first law class to win the university championship.
