FROM ARGENTINE.

Mr. Marino, of Buenos Aires, Registers for Farm Course.

Mr. Erasto Adolphus Marino of Buenos Aires, Argentine Republic, has registered for the agricultural course, and enters the school in the third year class. Mr. Marino has been away from home three years, part of which time he spent at the Ontario Agricultural college in Canada and his work there was sufficient to allow him to enter the third year course at the state farm.

He is familiar with Spanish, Italian, French, English and his own native tongue, Portuguese, and he aims to remain in the university the next six months, by which time he hopes to perfect his English speaking, after which he will enter the Royal Agricultural College of Berlin, where he will complete his degree. He is specializing in agriculture and wishes to familiarize himself with American agriculture and other industries and intends to return to his native country, where he hopes to interest himself in new packing house industries modeled after American methods.

The interesting part of Mr. Marino's entering the university is the manner in which he became interested in Nebraska and what persuaded him to come here instead of going back to Canada. It seems that he was in Chicago last year at the time of the International Live-Stock exhibit, when Nebraska's prize steer, the "Challenger" carried off the honors. He was much taken up by the showing made by Nebraska and coming from a great cattle region as he does, he was naturally much interested in the school that could produce such a fine specimen of live stock. During the summer while visiting the World's Fair at St. Louis, he again ran across the "Challenger" which has since been killed and stuffed and is on exhibit at the fair. Mr. Shedd, who is in charge of Nebraska's exhibit made his acquaintance and it was due to his efforts, together with those of Mr. E. H. Clark, who happened to be at the fair at the same time, that he decided to come to Nebraska.

He expresses himself as being much pleased with the university and thinks he will be able to gain much good from his association with it. There are four agricultural colleges in Argentine, which of course do not rank with American institutions and the government provides for twenty men each year to go to either the United States, Canada, or Australia where they may pursue studies along these lines. Mr. Marino is not, however, one of these, as he is pursuing his course on his own responsibility.

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
