honor system be instituted in the university, without the provision for "tattling" on those who commit offenses, and that those who do commit them should be given a reasonable chance to reform and continue with his university work.

The following is the committee appointed by President Sidwell:
Clement Waldron, Art Schreiber and Pearl Archibald.

The Sophomore class meeting to consider the honor system that is so largely agitated among the student body at the present time was very interesting throughout.

The first step taken after the meeting was called together was resolving of the class into a committee of the whole with DeYoung, the maker of the motion, as chairman.

The committee of the whole lasted for almost two hours in which time the discussions were based upon the resolutions passed in chapel yesterday morning. The former were, upon motion of Mr. Standeven, rejected and a new set which embodied the first two clauses of the chapel resolutions were adopted clause by clause.

The substance of the discussions showed throughout that all the members present were heartily in favor of a high standard of character, but doubted very much the effectiveness of some of the remedies introduced. The resolutions, however, as reported by the committee of the whole and accepted by the regular meeting afterwards are as follows:

We believe the members of the class of 1907 of the University of Nebraska in mass meeting assembled, believing the moral welfare of the University and of ourselves demands the adoption of a definite course to prevent cheating and fraud in examinations and class work, pass the following resolutions:

1. We believe the University should cultivate the highest ideals of personal and public honesty.
2. We believe no code of student morals ought to attempt to justify dishonest work of any kind.
3. We believe no student who will persist in working unfairly and dishonestly should be allowed to remain among us.
4. We believe the responsibility for the introduction of a higher moral standard among us rests upon the students collectively and individually.
5. We, therefore, agree individually to do our best by example and friendly warning to promote higher morals and to discourage and prevent dishonesty in all University work.

After the resolutions were disposed of a committee of three consisting of L. A. Hussong, D. P. DeYoung and Miss Beulah Hildreth were appointed by Pres. Wolf to confer with the student committee that met last night.

The Freshmen class held a rousing meeting in chapel yesterday. On account of the absence of the president, secretary Byron Eaton presided, and Hugh Wallace acted as secretary. After a short talk by Dr. Fling on plagiarism, the meeting was opened to general discussion. Among those who spoke were Messrs. Wellensick, Withers and Wallace. The class as a whole favored the resolutions, and by a popular vote elected Messrs. Munn, Wallace and Miss Tillotson as a committee to confer with similar committees from the three other classes.

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
