### Campus Gleanings

Professor Bruner will talk before the farmers' institute at Beatrice on the Hessian fly today.

The legislative committee on public lands and buildings visited the State Farm Friday, January 20.

A. A. Steel '99, has been elected as professor of mining engineering in the University of Arkansas.

Professor Chatburn is confined to his home with the la grippe and is unable to meet his classes.

I. C. Burnett, who has been day chemist for the Standard Beet Sugar company at Ames, Nebr., the past year, was a campus visitor during examination week.

P. L. Brockway has presented the department of civil engineering with a book of photographs showing the progress of construction of the mill dam at Beatrice, Nebr.

A universal mechanical drafting machine has been procured for the use of the bridge class and shortens the time ordinarily required to draw a bridge very materially.

O. F. Stevenson and C. E. Miller have left school for the semester to engage in engineering work. Miller is with the Chicago Northwestern and Stevenson is with the Union Pacific.

Cribbing has been detected at Chicago. The case of a student caught cheating in examinations was referred to a special committee of the faculty who decided that as a minimum penalty the student should lose all the credit for the work in which he had cheated, and also have a considerable amount of credit that he had already earned taken away from him.

Martin Heston, the great Michigan halfback, has been engaged by the athletic board of Drake University as football coach for the season of 1905. Heston is to receive \$1,200.00 for three months' work. This is said to be the largest salary ever received by a Michigan player for coaching. Next year Michigan, for the first time, will meet, in Drake, an opponent coached by one of her graduates.

Samuel C. Hawthorne, one of Nebraska's old war-horse debaters, is visiting in Lincoln and at the University after an absence of two years. Hawthorne was a member of the team that scored the second of the seven successive victories that Nebraska piled up in 1902-1904. It was against Kansas in April, 1902, that Charles M. Bracelen, now head of the department of history and teacher of debate in the Omaha High School; John C. Doubt and Hawthorne pulverized the three Kansans in Memorial hall on the reciprocity question. Hawthorne's logic and wit made up the final speech of the direct argument. The decision for Nebraska was unanimous. Mr. Hawthorne is now engaged in the mining business in the state of Washington. He will be in Lincoln for a month or two.
